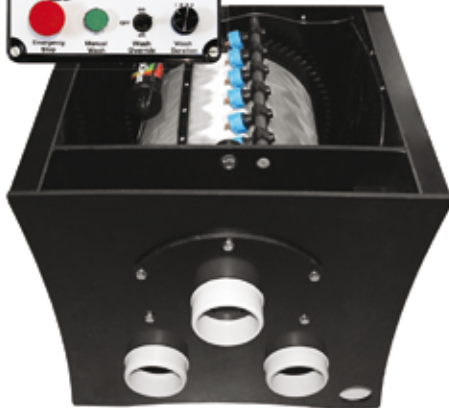

Australia's biggest koi show—the 46th Sydney Koi Show 2023! Congratulations to everyone involved, from the set-up to the pull down we have put on another world-class koi show. Our entry number totalled 545 koi, a terrific effort from 33 exhibitors.

The continued strength of our two koi clubs' combined financial and manpower means we are able to stage a koi show comparable to the best around the world. Our magnificent world-class venue inside the main arena at the Sydney International Equestrian Centre (SIEC) is a wonderful place to showcase our fabulous koi. As promised last year we sourced our water supply using different carters and all water was sourced externally. More expensive, but it paid dividends with no ill effects on our koi this year.

To all the exhibitors and helpers I would like to offer my huge congratulations, especially those who were exhibiting for the first time. The quality of the koi was again very pleasing. It is also very pleasing to see the positive comments from various countries about the Sydney Koi Show being posted on the various social media platforms—a sign we are being recognised for both the quality of our koi and the staging of the Sydney Koi Show.

We cannot stage a koi show without the help of our ZNA Judges. The Sydney Koi Show 2023

I think all of us will remember 2019, when a milestone decision was made to combine the efforts of the Koi Society of Australia (KSA) and the Australian Koi Association (AKA) to stage a single Sydney koi show. The result was something very special and everyone was determined to continue with the joint show in years to come.

Planning for the 2023 show began in February with show committee meetings generally held in the evening mid-week. Members this year included Richard Power, Adam Holden, Mark Robinson, John Zammit, Ron Moylan, David Chu, Joe Borg, Richard Davies, TK Hing and Ian Andrews. Graham Farnell is still involved but unable to attend meetings post his and Lee's move up to Browns Creek.

A major item to resolve was a reliable water source (last year the water from the Equestrian Centre hydrant appeared to be poor quality—although chemically it tested acceptably—and the koi did not look happy). A new supplier quoted \$2,000 to bring in water from outside in two trucks (15,000 L and 13,000 L) and this was accepted. Another issue has always been how long it took members to empty the bins after the show when everyone was already tired. Borrowing an idea from overseas, Ron Moylan arranged the Bayview Boy Scout Association to send three adults and 10–12 senior scouts to complete this task under supervision by a small group of members willing to stay back after the show. The clubs agreed to cover the association's costs with a donation of \$1,000 plus \$200 for petrol. The scouts were also promised a light meal and drinks.

Other agenda items, like show set-up organisation, bins, air stones, pumps, public insurance, vendors, catering, show dinner, advertising, power requirements, club banners, pot plants, cherry blossom trees, show stewards/teams, trainee judges, trophies including friendship awards, sponsorship, computers, printers, screens, arena layout, lanyards for exhibitor/helper identification—and of course our judges—were all dealt with over the next few months. Finding judges this year was particularly difficult, several Ian contacted were unable to

attend, but eventually everything was arranged and we looked forward to welcoming Shoji Saito ((CJ) Tokyo Chapter, Japan), Kittiphong Arjsamat ((ACJ) TKKG Thailand), King-Wen Hung ((ACJ) Taiwan) and Jerome Ng ((LCJ) Singapore). Mr Hung would bring his niece Claire to interpret. Ian spent a considerable time arranging the judges' schedule, not easy since they all arrived and departed at different times. We appreciated a lot of help looking after judges from Valentina (Waly) McNeill who picked up and looked after Shoji on his arrival on Friday, Lee Nguyen and David Chu who met and transported the other judges to their hotel on Friday plus huge thanks to Ron Moylan and Edith who looked after the judges and their respective partners on both Saturday and Monday. The Saturday tour was something new, a visit to the Sea Urchin Science Centre and Gallery at Kurrajong followed by lunch at the Hillbilly Cider Shed located at Bilpin. Judging by all the Facebook photos taken by our visiting judges the day was a huge success. Keeping judges entertained around the actual show is a huge task to organise, but this year it went well, apart from a near disaster on show morning. We had arranged a bus, with the same driver Adam Humphries, as last year to ferry the judges around, but about 5 am on Sunday morning, when we were catching koi, the driver called to say his eye had swelled up so badly he couldn't drive. (He actually ended up in hospital for an operation, so it was very serious). Very grateful thanks to Lee Nguyen who stepped into the breach and drove the bus, also to Brian Ma who acted as Lee's chauffeur to the hire company. It's nice when our guys help like this, especially right in the middle of show day.

As experienced last year, a pretty major worry was the number of koi likely to be entered into the show. The show site is so large that only two or three hundred koi would look lost in the area. This concern remained for a long time, as entries again were very slow to materialise. Just over two weeks out before the show there were only approximately 250 koi entered! However, numbers finally climbed to 546. A relatively early close to entries (two weeks) is essential, because allocation of bins suitable for each exhibitor's koi is another very major task, plus of course, time is needed to get the show boards printed. Shona's

wonderful show program allows an incredibly useful printout after koi entry is closed. It lists all exhibitors, number of koi entered, by the size of each koi, their combined length plus the number of bins requested initially by each exhibitor—not always possible to grant.

We try to make sure there is ample room for the koi in each vat and avoid them being

overcrowded, and allocate the taller bins to exhibitors showing the most, large koi. We now have 20 tall bins with the rest being the original height but the same two metre diameters. We then draw up a schematic plan for the show layout combining suitable height bins for each exhibitor. As previously, small bins were

organised for the Class 1 koi at one end of the show ring, each standing on an upturned bin to allow better visibility. This year, the small bins were arranged between the larger bins in a U shape, with a corridor between the rows, thus making distance walked by the judges between bins a little shorter.

Friday saw arrival of the bins with a first hurdle—pulling them apart! Some had stuck together so tightly it was impossible even with ten men to separate them. Dave Keen solved the problem by piping water down the narrow gap around each side of a bin. They eventually floated free. As last year, Dave also took charge of positioning the bins, according to the sizes and groupings of the layout plan. The Friday team set up all the power and air lines, the bunting around the outside of the bins, the tables and chairs inside the ring and the all-important tea trolley, the

(now quite extensive) artificial grass, the crosswire holding all the international and Australian flags, koinorbori and banners across the centre of the arena plus all other banners placed around the arena. Lastly, the ‘piece de resistance’ of our show, our Torii Gate—constructed by Richard Davies two years ago—was erected. Bright red, it looks pretty special as our centrepiece! Particularly combined with the artificial cherry blossom trees, potted palms and the koi models on plinths. Sadly, the four much larger model koi from Indonesia, ordered last year, still failed to arrive this year, but Ian met the lady in charge of the company last weekend in Singapore and we hope they will finally be delivered!

On Friday evening, Richard, Ian and I entertained the judges and their ladies (Jerome’s wife whom we have christened ‘Tiger Lily’ plus Mr Hung’s niece Claire—his interpreter) at a Middle Eastern restaurant in Parramatta. We

tried this venue out last year with great success, so were happy to revisit it. The private room the restaurant offers makes conversation and judging preamble so much easier and a great menu was offered. It was a very enjoyable evening.

Saturday saw the water trucks arriving for their first deliveries at 9.30 am. They had to go and refill once to complete our show bins (85 in total) plus three in the centre for the over-nighters and the water looked really good this year. The potted palms were placed, results boards set in position and all was ready bar the cherry blossom trees by midday. They arrived mid-afternoon but the company assembled them, so no work pending for the team.

Also on Saturday, quite a few of the vendors began their own set-up on the concourse above and within the arena. The number of vendors, organised by Richard Power, was very large again, including not only koi-related items and koi, but also bonsai, honey, woodturning, fancy goods plus small pets like birds, guinea pigs, rats and rabbits. I must say at this point, Richard really deserves several medals for all his very hard work with the

administration, finance and general organisation of the show, including the vendors, plus the dinner venue and menu on Monday night. As Ian quite rightly says to me, he is always a tower of strength and wonderfully reliable!

Show day finally dawned clear, bright and bitterly cold. It was 2°C when we first went outside at about 4.30 am to move the smaller koi. Being dark with very cold water this year the koi were less lively than usual and we did not need

the drag net for the main pond. Ian and I had very welcome help this year, our main pond koi-catching operation beginning with the arrival of Jun Gou and Anthony from WA at 5.00 am who helped keep us calm while transferring all the large koi to the tanks on the trailer, using plastic bags to hold their bodies straight. Koi socks are not rigid enough and we didn't want any broken spines. One thing we promised ourselves to remember: next year we really must move the best Ogon to the long pond in daylight—I am sure (again) we took the wrong fish to the show! Our four Ogon look too similar in the dark.

As last year, all the judging sheets had been pre-printed at home and it was decided that any corrections to entries should be just put into the computer program. Judging sheets were not re-printed. Koi withdrawn or moved were just crossed out/edited by hand on relevant sheets. Eddie Visser and Mimi Chu (as a very able trainee) comprised the main results team with a little help from myself, mainly filing competed paperwork. Judging commenced very quickly, the judges this year following protocol and selecting major awards only, first.

I think everyone was very happy to see Kevin and Misa Wong's magnificent Sanke again take Grand Champion A. This koi was a very worthy winner and I think presented even better than last year. Now moved to Go-Sanke group (ZNA recommendations), our Shiro Utsuri (bred by Bill Youl) was awarded Reserve Champion. GC B went to a beautiful clean Karashigoi exhibiting a superb conformation that was owned by John Zammit and our very special Ochiba Shigure, bred by Graham Fameli took Jumbo. Baby Champion was a delight. Selected by Allan Bennett (AJC) visiting from WA, this lovely young Kohaku owned and raised by Richard

Power had also taken the Jack Cohen award for most promising koi earlier in May. For the same koi to also win Baby Champion at the Sydney Koi Show was very special. Allan Bennett very kindly judged the size one koi this year.

After completion of the major awards, team photographs were taken and the Consul General of Japan, Mr Shuichi Tokuda, following an introduction from AKA's Patron, Simon Chapman, officially opened the show. The judges separated at this point and with assigned trainees and helper stewards selected first, second and third places in all six classes and 18 varieties. Each team also selected Best in Size—this makes a lot of sense—the team has already judged all the koi in a class therefore is aware of the best representative overall. This section of the judging progressed very quickly and was finalised about 1pm after which a break for lunch was made before selection of variety champions. Originally, we wanted all the judges to work together on this section of the show, but it proved unworkable—just too slow! Two teams were quickly assigned and everything was completed by 3.00 pm. As in previous years Paul Miglionico and myself selected a Unique Koi, the award again going to Mark Robinson's very special Goshiki Sanke, bred by John Ling. This koi looked superb with an excellent conformation, a very neat vignette (reticulated scale effect) and very well defined, deep sumi (black). Many koi can be 'unique' but few provide a truly superb conformation and quality at the same time.

On this note, I must mention a koi that 'stole the show'. David and Mimi Chu's young Kumonryu won five major awards. This koi had an exceptionally balanced pattern on either side of the dorsal, absolutely classic. Conformation and quality were also excellent.

One mistake this year—we didn't realise Kin-Gin-Rin Mujimono (basically single coloured Kawarimono like Chagoi) are now classified with Mujimono, not Kin-Gin-Rin B. This follows the same ruling as for Hikarimono (Ogon). This will be changed next year.

All in all, despite being miserably cold—keeping the crowd to fewer numbers this year—the day went well, always a treat to see some very special and very high quality koi

Once the show was declared closed and koi removed from the bins the Boy Scouts moved in to begin the mammoth task of emptying the bins, accomplished by around 6.45 pm—much faster than in previous years. Quite a lot of equipment was also packed up at this point. I took a carload with me, as did Ian. Major items had to be left until Monday morning; the judges were driven back to their hotel just after 4.00 pm before coming to us for dinner at 6.30 pm. I was very appreciative of the gap before entertaining them all! The evening went really well, although ten around my dining table was a bit of a squeeze. No one seemed to mind though.

Monday lunchtime saw the completion of the pull-down with everything going back to storage smoothly. Ian arrived home for a quick lunch, shower and change before we both headed out to join Ros and Lars Lindberg and transport all the trophies and Hikari-sponsored gifts in two car loads to Smithfield RSL to set up for the evening prize giving and dinner. The tables with all the trophies looked magnificent when we had finished setting them out. We collapsed with a much-needed glass of wine and admired them before all the guests began to arrive. As last year, the evening went very well and was (hopefully) enjoyed by everyone who attended. I

am delighted to say the meal again was excellent.

What a mammoth task this event is! Four days of hard labour for everyone involved, but without you all, there literally would be no show and this is becoming a truly great one on the world koi calendar, every year an improvement on the last. Thirty-three exhibitors this year, not quite up to last year's record of thirty eight—but an excellent turnout, nonetheless.

It remains for me to express heartfelt thanks to everyone involved in this show, impossible to mention every name—such a huge group! However, I do add special thanks to Hikari our sponsor, and to Lee Nguyen for stepping in to save the day with the judges' bus. Also to Ron Moylan and Edith for entertaining the judges on Saturday and Monday. I would also like to mention that Ros and Lars Lindberg collected, cleaned and updated the plaques on all the perpetual trophies, another huge task, much appreciated.

Last but very definitely not least, Ros Lindberg with able helpers Rita Borg and Misa Wong provided her very welcome hot bacon and egg roll breakfast at the show on Sunday morning for all exhibitors and helpers. The show would not be the same without Ros's breakfast!

The Sydney Koi Show again proudly keeps Australia on the map internationally amongst the best of koi shows. Where do we go from here? Always improvements to consider—could we introduce koi bags for size one koi? After judging, the koi could then be released into their owner's large bin (if one was available). Something to think about and to discuss at future meeting nights?

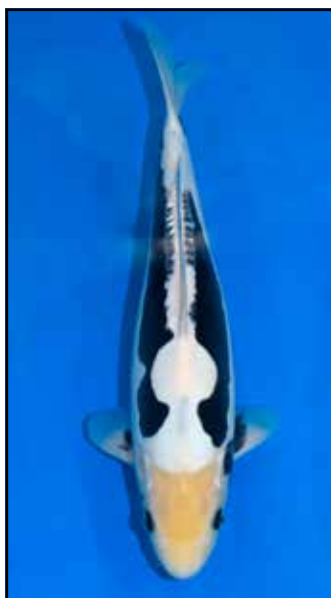

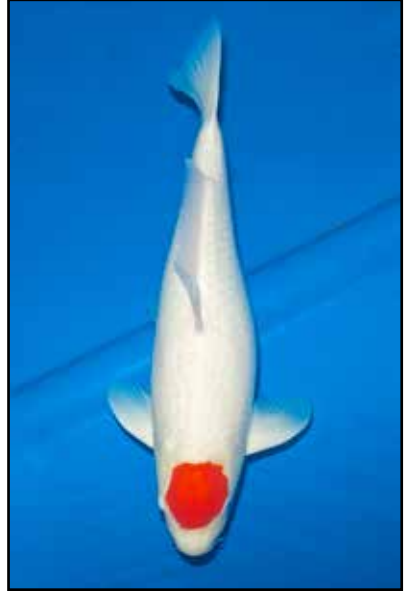

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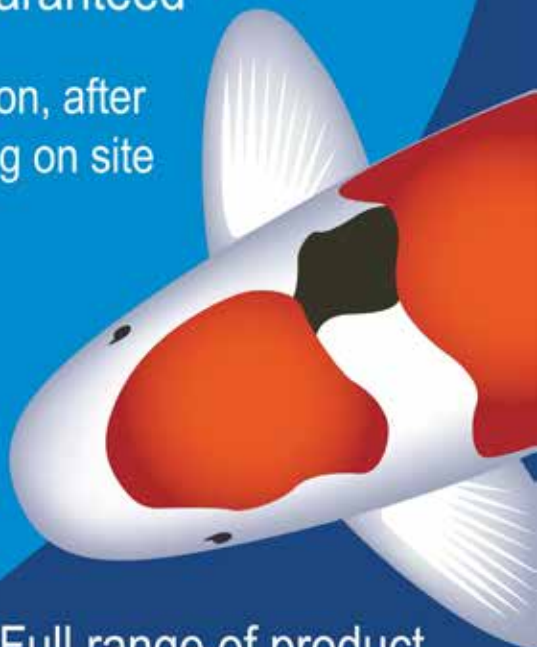
